Homeless Prevention Project:

- This project is designed to assist renters who are in danger of losing their housing as a result of loss of employment or a reduction in work hours or income. Eligible applicants may receive case management services, budget assistance, and financial assistance. To be eligible for assistance, applicants **MUST** be at or below 30% Area Median Income for your county and have a court-ordered eviction notice.

**An initial assessment will occur to determine eligibility, verifiable economic or personal crisis, and whether this program would genuinely provide the assistance needed for the applicant during the crisis period to help them maintain current housing or obtain more affordable housing. To be eligible, applicants must have a documentable hardship and the capacity and willingness to plan for and obtain regular and continuing income, and must be willing to work with staff to develop and keep a realistic budget.*
